7. The Shortage of Psychiatrists in Hawaii	Ms. Connie Mitchell, Chief Executive Officer for the Institute of Human Services (IHS), shared her concerns regarding the shortage of psychiatrists in Hawaii and the negative impact it has on the population that her organization serves.  Ms. Mitchell explained that it has been difficult to find a psychiatrist to fill the vacancy at IHS. After many attempts in reaching out to	For information only.		

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	other agencies and to the Department of Health, she felt the need to contact the SCMH for assistance.			
	<ul> <li>Ms. Mitchell cited some of her concerns that she has with the shortage of psychiatrists:</li> <li>A lack of partnership with the University of Hawaii (UH) John A. Burns, School of Medicine;</li> <li>Many psychiatrists are moving towards private practice due to the</li> </ul>			
	<ul> <li>Many psychiatrists are moving towards private practice due to the high cost of living in Hawaii, and some psychiatrists once trained in Hawaii, leave for better financial opportunities on the mainland;</li> <li>Hiring psychiatrists outside of Hawaii presents several challenges, one being, the cultural sensitivity to the local culture; and</li> <li>A lack of training available for psychiatrists in the mental health field in Hawaii.</li> </ul>			
	Ms. Mitchell stated that she believes the State of Hawaii, the Department of Health, should invest in psychiatrists to treat the homeless, individuals with serious mental illness, and the underserved population before it reaches astronomical proportions.			
	Mr. Keane shared the use of Telehealth and the merits of its usage in addressing the psychiatrists' shortage on Hawaii Island.			
	Ms. Clarke shared that the Adult Mental Health Division (AMHD) is addressing the shortage of psychiatrists and other mental health staff, by working closely with regional partners, such as, the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and other agencies. She noted that HRSA is primarily interested in placing new graduates in rural areas of the State.			
	In a follow-up discussion, members decided to address the shortage of psychiatrists in future meetings to find solutions. Members brainstormed and decided to get input on the shortage from the AMHD and the Child and Adolescent Mental Health Division, as well as the UH John A. Burns School of Medicine.
